- What are new tasks and roles of QA agencies in various European countries?
- What are key factors driving these tasks/roles, and how will they impact practices in the future?

Background: More uncertainty...

Trends in Europe

- A European higher education system where QA has a key role (ESG)
- Still national jurisdiction over higher education national agendas matter....
- QA as an instrument for political opportunism
- QA pressured by other developments new players, complaints about bureaucracy, national reform attempts



The theoretical point-of-departure:

- Agency drift agencies taking up new tasks, roles and responsibilities
- Europeanization and national jurisdiction may open up for more standardization and more diversity at the same time
- Two strategic directions:
 - New tasks
 - New fields



Data, methods & funding

Approach:

- Initial mapping of «interesting cases»
- •Six agencies identified (A₃ES, evalag, FINEEC, NVAO, QQI, UKÄ)
- Interviews (17) and document analysis
- Funded by NOKUT

Results (1)

A3ES (2009):

 Strong focus on research and analysis – links to an independent research centre (CIPES)

Evalag (2000):

- One of ten agencies operating in Germany
- Consultancy and R&D project as a way to position itself in the competition?



Results (2)

FINEEC (1996/2014):

- History a small focused agency
- Merger broadening the scope of activities covering all levels in education – and new cross-sectoral evaluations carried out

NVAO (2003):

- Cross-border agency (Netherlands/Flanders)
- «Appreciative approach» (Flandern) a move away from standards and compliance, inquiry driven methods – no template, no comparison



Results (3)

QQI (2012 after a merger):

- Focus on «qualifications» and responsible for the qualification framework
- New regulative role (private sector) including financial viability/increasing focus on transnational education

UKÄ (1995/2013):

- Combining QA with a range of other tasks (producing national statistics)
- Piloting QA of research



Reflections

Incrementalism, innovation or transformation?

- «Change» as the (new) normal...
- National authorities still important as configurators, orchestrators of QA (mergers, new tasks, etc)
- Agencies in need to navigate between European and domestic expectations and roles
 - Agencies pursuing both strategic options: new tasks AND new fields...
 - Definition of a QA agency is in flux...?
