### The Origin of the ESGs

- Established as part of efforts to **enhance quality assurance** in the EHEA in 2005, which emerged through the Bologna Process.
- Developed to ensure consistent quality standards across EHEA universities and to support mutual recognition of qualifications.
- Builds upon the goals of **transparency, mobility, and academic cooperation** set by the Bologna Process.
- Since 2005, considerable progress has been made in quality assurance as well as
  in other Bologna action lines such as qualifications frameworks, recognition and
  the promotion of the use of learning outcomes, all these contributing to a
  paradigm shift towards student-centred learning and teaching.

**Current debates** – Preparing for the 2027 update of the ESGs

- Focus areas include social dimension aspects, digital transformation, sustainability and evolving learning models.
- We stress the need for a greater focus on inclusivity and accessibility within the ESG framework.
- **Stronger accountability** measures for institutions to implement ESG principles effectively.


